







What to expect:

Get to know the gopher tortoise!

Gopher tortoises got their name because they live in underground burrows. These amazing burrows can be 40 feet long and 10 feet deep!

Gopher tortoises live in dry, sandy environments that experience fires.



In these communities, fire is natural and beneficial. Plants and animals who live here have adapted to thrive in fire, and some plants even require fire to release their seeds!

When the land is too hot and dry or a fire is spreading through the grasses, the burrow is a safe and cool place for other animals to relax.

How does fire benefit the gopher tortoise?


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The gopher tortoise is known as a **keystone species**. A keystone species is an animal that many other species rely on for survival. In fact, scientists estimate that over 350 different animals will use gopher tortoise burrows!

WHAT'S NEXT Get ready to channel your inner gopher tortoise!

To be a gopher tortoise in its burrow, gather blankets and pillows and build a pillow fort in your home. Be sure to ask for help from an adult. You can use furniture like chairs and beds for support, then drape the blankets over. Use pillows to add walls and extra comfort. Get creative and decorate your burrow however you like.

Say hey to the scrub jay!

Florida scrub jays live in scrub communities. They are **endemic** to Florida, meaning you can't find them anywhere else in the world!

They live in family units that include parents, older siblings and baby birds. The whole family works together to find food and guard their territory from predators.

Scrub jays need protection from people, too.

Most of their homes have been changed or completely removed to make space for people. Park Rangers and scientists work very hard to learn more about scrub jays and restore the homes they lost.

With up to eight members in a family, scrub jays have a lot of mouths to feed. So they eat a variety of foods plentiful in their scrub communities, such as nuts, insects and berries.

You might not think bugs sound very tasty, but the recipe below will have you eating like a jay with edible "ants!"

ANTS ON A LOG

Ingredients **Materials**

1. Celery 2. Your favorite nut butter Plate

3. Raisins or other dried fruit **Butter knife**

Preparation

1. Wash celery and cut into 3 inch pieces.

2. Use the butter knife to spread peanut or sunflower seed butter in the hollow side of the celery sticks to make your "logs."

3. Place dried fruit and berries on top of nut butter to make "ants."

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

Meet the manatee!

Manatees are marine mammals. They live their whole life in water, munching on aquatic plants. Manatees don't like the cold, so they love hanging out around Florida!

HOT AND COLD GAME

What You'll Need:

- At least 2 players
- A small item to hide
- A stopwatch

Where to Play:

Somewhere you can move around with hiding spots.

Rules:

One person is the Hider and the other one is the Manatee. The Hider places the item in a secret hiding spot. The Manatee looks for the item by listening to temperature clues from the Hider. Say "Cold" and "Colder" when the Manatee is moving away from the item, and say "Warmer" and "Just Right" as the Manatee gets closer to the item. Use a stopwatch to see how long it takes the Manatee to find the item.



Introducing the American alligator!

Alligators live in fresh water habitats. They are the top predators in their communities. Predators are important because they keep everything in balance. Without predators, there would be too many prey. Prey, such as fish and other




animals would eat all the plants. Without plants, no one would have what they need to survive.

Alligators have been around since the time of the dinosaurs. However, due to over-hunting, they almost disappeared from the earth. Now laws are in place to protect them.

Alligators have a special way of hunting prey. They use vibrations. Alligators do not need to see their food to know it is there.

When prey move in or near the water, they create small ripples. Alligators have specialized ears inside their head and sensory organs around their face that help them make sense of the vibrations, so they can tell the difference between prey and non-prey items like falling sticks. This special sense helps alligators find food, even in the dark!

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Can you identify objects without seeing them like an alligator?

Have a friend or family member pick three random objects from around your home. Put on a blindfold while they collect the items. One at a time, feel the objects without seeing them and then guess what they are. Take off the blindfold and see how you did!

Which object was the hardest to guess?
What made it difficult?

It is difficult to identify objects without sight! Throwing trash or food into a alligator's habitat can create vibrations and confuse them. They might accidentally eat things that make them sick.
